General Recommendations

Submit to only one journal at a time. If your paper is rejected, you are free to submit it to another journal.

You will be expected to adapt your paper to the style sheet of the journal only if it is accepted.

Filologia Mediolatina

Profile: Filologia Mediolatina publishes papers specifically related to philological aspects of Medieval Latin literature: manuscript transmission, textual criticism, sources, Latin language, Fortleben of classical and late antique authors in the Middle Ages, etc.

Review of submissions: All submitted papers will be peer reviewed (double blind) by specialists (usually two referees are designated, one of them chosen among the members of the journal's scientific committee). The ultimate decision on the publication is made by the Director, and takes into account the evaluations of the referees, and the integration by the author of any modification they might have suggested.

It is possible to submit several articles by different authors with a common subject matter (for instance, papers from a panel). In this case, there must be an introductory essay, and all

submitted papers will be peer reviewed in the usual manner. If possible, these papers will appear in the same issue, otherwise they will appear in the same year.

Papers accepted for publication are double blind-refereed to ensure academic integrity. *Peritia* is also REF-compliant.

Peer review

Peritia is a peer-reviewed journal. All articles are sent to experts who provide feedback on suitability for publication. A peer reviewer may suggest revisions to the article and these will be passed on to the author. We operate a strict policy of double blind peer review. The

author's identity is not known to the reviewer and vice versa. The submitted article should not include the name of its author and self-identification, either in the text or in footnotes, should be avoided.

Pursuing the Latin branch of European culture and civilization, *WS* also welcomes studies on Medieval and Neolatin language and literature down to the baroque age. Articles on the reception of Classical, Medieval, and Neolatin literature in modern vernacular writers are also accepted.
